# **December 2024 Greys Court**

We exert leverage at Greys Court

Do you remember doing all that 'principle of levers' at school? I think it was called 'mechanics' then or even, with dignity, 'applied maths'. Well same thing at Greys Court in the top wood where a huge tree has fallen across the footpath. We arrive-eventually, all 17 of us, as it is a bit of a trek to the site. Leo has already split the main trunk and whilst most of us are on holly bashing or bramble bashing, he is chain sawing the smaller branches. Luckily all our kit and tools go up in the NT pickup truck ( well, including three of us squashed in for a hair raising lift along narrow paths Buddy Leo's dog is very accommodating sharing the back seat)

Now we have to clear the main sections of the fallen trunk away from the path so 'principle of levers' get a fulcrum and you can move a mountain.

First, attach a good working strength chain to the trunk.

Next, loop the attached cable round a convenient tree and link this to the patent level gear.....

......then wiggle the lever (vigorously) back and forth to take up the slack ...and slowly a huge section moves but not quite in the right direction....

So, fix the cable to a loose pulley further up on a trunk section and your leverage works at a sort of right angle and mirabile dictu the section moves quietly off the path and out of the way.
